Beloved in Christ,

This month's theme with Nebraska Synod is "Go and...Be Honest." In our culture of "Nebraska Nice," this can be challenging for us to do, at least all the time. On the other hand, a wise man once told me that if we are "always honest, then we don't have to worry about keeping our story straight." I heard that advice over 25 years ago, and it still resonates with me.

Being honest, though, sometimes comes

with a cost. Being brutally honest sometimes is not much more than that: brutal. We can hurt others with our brutal honesty, and that doesn't do anyone any good at all. Loving honesty, however, or what we might call "constructive criticism," is a little bit different. St. Paul reminds us in Ephesians 4:15-16 that we are to speak the truth in love: "But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knitted together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love." (NRSV) In the heat of the moment, this can be quite difficult to remember. But we must also remember that if loving each other was

easy, everyone would do it. And not everyone can. And Jesus promised that the world would know we are his followers by our love (and frankly, the world will also know us by our lack of love, too).

This month, as we watch and wait together in this Season of Advent, we look to the One who is Love Incarnate. Jesus is the One who reveals God's truest nature to us: love. We can't get any more honest than that.

Beloved in Christ,

[October and November have] been a time of heartbreak and frustration for many of us, as we have seen violence and suffering continue in some places around the world and erupt again in others. I have been in conversation with many of you across the synod regarding the conflict in Israel/Palestine and the varying statements about that conflict from myself, Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, and others. After many of these conversations, I have found myself reflecting on the myriad possibilities for interpretation that each of us brings to the table. One single sentence which may appear to have a simple, straightforward meaning can be received and understood far differently than its originator may have intended. Social media has been the latest in a long line of environments where fostering outrage is the coin of the realm, and these days, business is good. When this is the case, there may develop a fear of speaking out entirely, or a tendency to say so little that even when one does speak, nothing is actually said. This makes November 2023 a curious month to live out the charge to "Go and...be honest," but perhaps it is a crucial month to do so as well.

Assuming the mantle of honesty is a double-edged sword. Criticism is easy; *constructive* criticism is difficult. Distinguishing between the two as a listener can be excruciating. I'm certain many of you have experienced the trauma which can result from someone who believes they are a theologian of the cross and simply calling a thing what it actually is. Some of you, like myself, have also experienced the horror of realizing that your truth-telling has actually made a situation worse. Even when we are at our best, living out our calling to bear true witness, being truth-tellers and truth-hearers is hard work, requiring an intense vulnerability as we genuinely listen and speak to one another without defensiveness or unjustified interpretation. This sort of honesty reminds me of the lyrics of a Rich Mullins song:

And it's hard when your soul has been stripped bare Hard to lift your eyes toward Heaven...Lord it's hard, oh, it's hard, You know it's hard to be like Jesus.

It is incredibly hard to be the kind of honest God is calling us to be, but it's also incredibly important. In a time when many have what the apostle Paul described as "itching ears...accumulating for themselves teachers to suit their own desires," how can we practice speaking the truth in love, and listening for that truth in the same love? How can we offer a gracious environment in which honesty is treasured, vulnerability is protected, and all are truly welcomed? A theologian of the cross might call that sort of environment heavenly, for that's what it is.

BE HONEST

Honesty requires vulnerability, awareness, and a willingness to really listen. Assumptions and half-truths can lead us to misunderstand the situation and story. What does reconciliation mean as we strive to move from places of misunderstanding? God calls us to be honest. Sometimes, that may look like lament and confession, and other times hymns of praise and gratitude.

Questions to Consider:

- What is a time you didn't tell the whole truth... or were not honest?
- What piece of history should you/could you explore with a lens of honesty?
- In what way are you being dishonest in your life?
- GO and express gratitude by saying thank you to someone who deserves it.

Prayer: Reconciling God, we ask for forgiveness for the times we have not reconciled our differences and acknowledged the hurts and wounds we have caused. Amen.


Here is the schedule of themes for Advent:

- 2. Because of COVID, I was unable to attend the Fall Theological Conference in Kearney. Hotel reservations and conference registration are non-refundable.
- 3. Congratulations to Jeff Harris, winner of the 2023 Golden Spatula at the BBQ Cook Off.
- 4. We had a Harvest Host guest on October 30.
- 5. I met several times with the Nominating Committee. The election slate is now full.
- 6. I officiated at a non-member wedding on Nov 4.
- 7. Tri-Church Youth Group met on Nov 5 and did a brief tour of Wyuka Cemetery. We then met with Tom Roper and heard about the ministry of End of Life Care. The evening ended with chili and cinnamon rolls at American Lutheran. Next meeting will be December 3 for a bonfire.
- 8. I was too tired to attend the Freed for Life event on Nov 5.
- 9. I attended the Budget Meeting on Nov 7 with the Finance Committee.
- 10. The Kouzina Food Truck (The Parthenon) was a huge success. I heard from several of our members that it was by far their favorite food truck of the season.
