Dear Siblings in Christ:

There is a new Sheriff in town! As you will read in the following pages of The StAnd, there are some exciting changes happening in our Nebraska Synod. (For a full report on these changes, please see the letter from Bishop Scott.)



One of the changes coming our way is a monthly focus for all congregations of Nebraska Synod. This month, it is prayer. Now really, focusing on prayer should not be "new" to any of us. Prayer is one of the disciplines to which all who follow Jesus are called. But if you're like me and have a busy schedule most days, prayer can be one of those things that can easily be neglected.

Martin Luther once said "I have so much to do this day that I will spend the first three hours in prayer." That's great for Brother Martin, but I don't have that kind of time, nor do I have that kind of patience! However, that doesn't mean I am "off the hook" for not spending time in prayer, either. What it DOES mean is that I just get to work a little harder at making the time to do it. For me, taking a morning walk early in the morning is a great time to pray and think. Sometimes it's taking a few moments in the afternoon to be still and look at the sky (I know...it sounds weird...but it is wonderfully centering when I actually do it). And of course, there are mealtime prayers and nighttime prayers, too. I think what matters isn't HOW we pray or even HOW OFTEN. What matters MOST is that WE DO IT!

You've heard me say many times that I do not think there is a "wrong way" to pray, except for maybe the harm of others. Otherwise, we can't mess it up. Prayer is nothing more than having a conversation with God. Sometimes we speak and God listens, and sometimes God speaks and we listen, as Mother Teresa once said.



The following is a launchpad for your own reflection about your prayer life. This reflection is provided by the Synod:

Prayer is the grounding for our relationship with God. From formal prayers offered in worship, prayers at meals, and fleeting moments of prayer, our lives are enveloped in prayer. In prayer, we both listen and share what is in our hearts and on our minds. We move, live, and serve in and out of our prayers.

Questions to consider:

- What is your big prayer at this time?
- What is going on in the lives of your neighbor? How can you pray for them?
- Where will you *GO and...* grow your prayer life this month

Prayer: Holy One, help me pause and engage in conversation with you this month and always. Amen.

Suggested Song: Lord, Listen to Your Children Praying (ELW 752)

A Letter from Bishop Scott Johnson

Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Matthew 28.18-20

Dear friends in Christ,

Last spring, long before Synod Assembly, I picked up a copy of the book *How To Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going* by Susan Beaumont. What seemed like an interesting leadership exercise before the Assembly became a much higher priority afterwards. Within that book, Beaumont lists six principles for discernment in liminal times that I've tried to practice in this first year as bishop. I've found principles 3, 4, and 6 to be especially important in this early time as bishop:

3. Discernment is a gift from God, mediated through the presence of the Holy Spirit.

4. Discernment is a **discipline we practice**.

6. Discernment unfolds in **God's** time.

I am not by nature a visionary leader: I'm one who prefers to build a vision collaboratively, particularly in this new call where so much is unfamiliar to me. So we have practiced the discipline of discernment in grounding our work together as a new staff.

Here are some key components that will mark how we work together with you in the immediate future:

- Nebraska Synod staff mission statement: **The Nebraska Synod Staff accompanies and empowers with Spirit-led joy, integrity, and accountability.**
Synod staff strategic core values: **Leadership, Accompaniment, Interpretation.**
- **One Nebraska Synod staff team.** The synod web page no longer lists staff under Mobility, Discipleship, or Administration. While individual responsibilities continue to be divided according to job description, skills, and expertise, we've shifted to processing more of the work we do as a whole team, and we've found it gives us better understanding of how our diverse areas of responsibility fit together and complement each other.
- **One Nebraska Synod office.** Technology allows us to focus our work in ways that aren't as defined by geography as in the past, and our increasing emphasis on collaboration is more effective when we can be in one place. We've closed the North Platte and Lincoln offices, with thanks to First Lutheran in North Platte and Grace Lutheran in Lincoln for their gracious hospitality in previous years. This will require us to be purposeful and strategic about how and when we engage throughout the synod, and we're working on those pieces as well.
- **Category-based Mobility Process.** Staff working in mobility are centering their work in categories: Pastor Heidi Wallace is working with congregations desiring to begin or continue some sort of shared ministry; Pastors Greg Berger and Kristin Van Stee are working with congregations seeking full-time solo or multi-staff needs, and Pastor Kathy Montira is working with rural, open country, and outpost ministries which may be full-time or part-time.
- **Faith Formation belongs to everyone.** Faith formation remains a priority in the Nebraska Synod, but we believe it's time to embrace a wider, more collaborative model where Synod staff serve as partners and conveners (in line with our strategic core values of Leadership and Accompaniment). This will be an evolving, experimental process led by Deacon Sunni Richardson in collaboration with youth ministry leaders throughout the Nebraska Synod.

Letter from Bishop Johnson continued

- **One Synod, One Church, Together.** The future of the Nebraska Synod, and for the ELCA as a whole, will be marked by a growing practice of collaboration and a flattening of institutional structures. The church always reflects the culture in which it lives, and we've been moving this way for quite a long time – what we've been working on since September 1st is just the next step in the evolution of the Nebraska Synod staff, and that evolution will continue long after my time as bishop has come and gone. We are not simply an association of congregations, but rather one synod, one church, together.

Thank you for the privilege of serving this call as bishop. I look forward to the many ways we will "Go and" be one synod, one church, together, in the year to come!

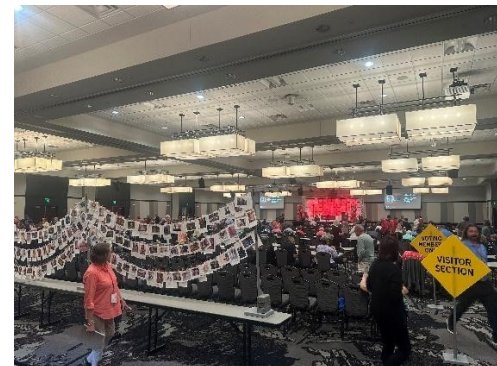

GO AND...LAUNCHES AT SYNOD ASSEMBLY

June 5, 2023

Ready, Set, Go! In the Great Commission, Jesus calls us to GO. We are taking those words to heart.

At Nebraska Synod we launched our year-long focus to "Go And..." We invite you to be part of this call to GO! During Synod Assembly, we will lean in as God's people called, gathered, and sent to "Go And...". We kicked-off a year with 12 intentional themes inviting you to pray; listen; share your story; serve with neighbors; ask; be honest; be present; rest; have the conversation; be intentional; tell the story; and be the church.



Each month, the Synod Staff will provide an introduction to the theme, along with reflection questions, a prayer, and suggested hymn or worship songs. Resources will be available for download and can be utilized for bulletin inserts, newsletters, worship slides, or social media posting. Resources will be shared on the synod website so that you can utilize them in your Bible Studies, Adult Forums, Faith Formation discussions, discipleship reflections at home, and more. There is a wealth of ideas out there! Co-create with us this year by sharing your ideas and experiences. We learn from each other and your idea may be just what someone else is looking for. Together, all 90,000 of us, will be focused on responding to Christ's sending in the Great Commission, to GO and..., and to really live out the joy and hope of Pentecost!

Report from Synod Assembly

We attended the synod assembly, June 2nd and 3rd, in Kearney Ne. The assembly started with prayers, singing and communion.

Our Bishop, Scott Johnson, introduced the theme of this years assembly GO And...with the words from Matthew 28:19-20 GO therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember I am with you always, to the end of the age. Bishop Scott told of the change and construction that have been regular themes in the work of the synod staff this past year. Some long term staff members felt called to new things after years of faithful dedicated service in the synod office. "The staff that stayed on and those who joined the synod staff spent a great deal of time in deep dives into what God is asking of us in 2023 and beyond.

Keynote Speaker Rev. Maristela Freiberg

Rev. Freiberg, born and raised in Brazil, serves as the Director for Evangelical Mission and Assistant to the Bishop in the New Jersey synod. Last year she invited a group of Leaders to design GO and... The group met monthly to learn from each other how to reach out, to listen and build relationships with neighbors, to figure out ways to be CHURCH now and into the future to which God is calling the Church. Rev. Freiberg reminded us that the Church exists for the world, sent to make Christ known. GO And make disciples of all nations. We are called to share the good news. GO And LOVE. Rev. Freiberg shared a quote "how do we lead when we don't know where we are going?"

The answer: we figure it out together!

Rev. Freiberg introduced the 3 step process

- 1. Listen-to God and each other**
- 2. Act-so we can learn**
- 3. Share-our stories in community**

Rev. Christopher Otten ELCA

Rev. Otten serves as the assistant to the Presiding Bishop and Director of Federal Chaplaincies. Beginning in June 2021, he also supports and coordinates for all chaplains with the ELCA, including hospitals, hospices and other service agencies. Rev. Otten told us LUTHERANS travel light! We only need to pack two things LOVE-love the Lord your God with all your soul and with all your mind and LOVE your neighbor as yourself. So keep it simple and travel light!

Dan Friedlund Synod Treasurer

Dan shared info on our Nebraska Synod mission Share. Mission share Revenue forecast for Nebraska for 2023 is \$2,692,000.00 We were able to see an online report of each Church mission share giving. For St. Andrews this year the estimated giving is \$21,846.00.

Budget Meeting

During the budget meeting a late Resolution was introduced. Otto Schultz, along with other members, introduced a resolution that Bishop Scott appoint a committee to form guidelines addressing how to support Pastors that have addiction and or mental health problems. The answer is not to fire them but to help them. A committee needs to come up with guidelines and ways to help those pastors in need. The resolution was approved.

MINISTRY OF THE MONTH FOR JULY:

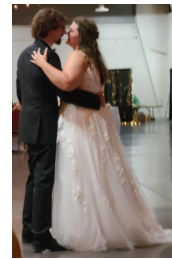

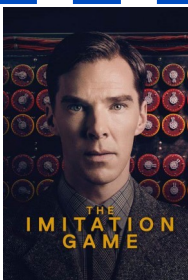


OUR CHRISTIAN SYMPATHY SURROUNDS:

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS JUNE, 2023

1. We have a leak in the sanctuary roof. Charlotte Pasco is aware.
2. The AC in the Library is not working. It appears the relay is not working. The part was installed in 1962 and the parts no longer exist. Charlotte is working on a solution to this issue.
3. There has been hail damage to the red shingles on the east and west ends of the sanctuary. These need to be painted and/or repaired. Charlotte will get a bid for repair.
4. Doug has a plan to fix the candleholder part of the candelabrum. Pastor is going to make drinking straw collars to keep the wicks from being caught in the threads of the brass toppers.
5. Intinction will be practiced throughout the summer for Holy Communion.
6. Students from The Lutheran Student Center will worship with us on June 25.
7. A report to the Emmanuel Foundation regarding the grant we received is due at the end of June. Charlotte Burke and Gene will meet with Shiloh next week.
8. Gene and Sharlotte Veburg are looking at Sunday School curriculum for the Fall. Augsburg is discontinuing their "paper" materials and will be offering online only.
9. Tech Team Update: Jonathan reported the motherboard in the new computer is having issues. He ordered a new motherboard and it should be here by the end of the week. As soon as that is installed, the new computer software can be re-installed and brought to the sanctuary for our use for worship.
10. We had 3 Harvest Host Guests in May and 4 so far in June¹
12. Prayer and Care is not functioning like it should. Some of our homebound folks are being visited, but not everyone is. Pastor will be looking into this and calling a meeting in the Fall to address home visitations.
12. Opening Balance in Checking was \$18,801.84 and the ending balance was \$17,566.73. Opening Balance in Savings was \$34,136.47 and the ending balance was \$34,140.82.
13. Regular giving in May was \$6,659.66 less than the budget estimate. Year to date regular giving is less than th budget estimate by \$15,251.87. Special giving for May was \$572.29.
14. Faith Partners will have a speaker on Suicide Prevention on Aug 20. On Sept 13, we will host a QPR (suicide prevention) Training for the public. October 15 we will hear about Justice in Action. November 12, Pastor Otto Schultz will be here to talk about codependency.
15. The Backpack balance looks good going into the Fall. The congregation can expect a presentation on where we stand when we get closer to the Fall Semester.
