# St. Andrew's Lutheran Church

Dear Siblings in Christ:

"Who is my neighbor?" is a question that has perplexed us for generations. The rich man asked it of Jesus, who responded with the well-known tale of the Good Samaritan. Mr. Rogers invited all of us to be his "neighbor" on his beloved TV show on PBS. Who do you consider to be your "neighbor"? Someone who lives in the house next door or



across the street? Someone with whom you have shared a pew for the last 20 years? A friend/acquaintance? Or someone you have never met?

The word "neighbor" is broader than we might want to think. Our neighbors are in close proximity to us; they are also halfway around the world. If we subscribe to The Butterfly Affect, then we know that whatever choices we make here affects others elsewhere. We are all interconnected. Everyone is our neighbor. Even the Earth.

On Sunday, Sept 17, we took a few moments during worship to bless the quilts. Our Quilters have worked for the past year making over 150 quilts to send either to Camp Carol Joy Holling for the quilt auction or to send to Lutheran World Relief to be distributed all over the world. These quilts could be used for bedding, as a wall in a home, as a carrier of other belongings, for shade, or simply to be kept warm because it may be the only possession a person owns. These works of art were made with love and are set out with love to serve God and neighbor. The Quilters work together, form community, and are neighbors to one another, even as they become neighbors to the world.

This month's theme in the "Go and..." series from Nebraska Synod is "Go and...Serve with Neighbors." As you will read in Bishop Scott's reflection on the next page, the word "with" is especially important. When we serve our neighbors, we do not need to have the attitude of coming in to "save" them, as in a "top down" kind of serving – we are serving them and they are expected to receive it. That's been the way we have done it for a while, and it's not always helpful. But when we can figure out how to walk alongside our neighbors, to serve "with" them, to help and support what they are already doing, that is how we serve "with" one another.

### **Bishop Scott Alan Johnson's September Reflection**

From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us.

—2 Corinthians 5:16-19—

I spent a year between undergraduate and seminary education working at the Lutheran Center at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. One of the projects assigned to me that year was a fundraising letter sent to alumni and supporters of the ministry. After I turned in my first draft, Pastor Larry Meyer went over it with me, asking for only one correction. In the letter, I'd written something that suggested that our ministry was "bringing Jesus to campus." "We believe God is always with us," said Pastor Meyer. "Our work is to help people look for the many ways God is already present."

I've been thinking about this as we embark on "Serve with neighbors" as this month's "Go and..." theme. What's kept poking at me is the preposition, with. There's a lot of specificity contained in those four letters. Serving with our neighbors implies that there's already some sort of work going on – that instead of our neighbors being the recipients of our service, they could be the instigators of it. We often approach works of service from a position of privilege: we see ourselves as the good Samaritan (often leaving out the scandal of that particular parable's hero being an unrighteous Gentile) or those who've been in the vineyard for a full day's work. Have we ever considered that we could just as easily be the workers invited to join in the last hour, or the innkeeper trusted with continuing the care another has alreadv started? 2

Serving <u>with</u> our neighbors places us in a position of accompaniment. God's story already includes our own story and that of our neighbor. This lens of accompaniment has redefined ELCA Global Mission for a number of years now: "In Christ's reconciliation, we are all in relationship, all part of the body of Christ. We are not just called to love those who love us, who 'get' us and understand us because we are very much alike. Rather we are called to love and be loved by those who are not like us, whom we might have to work quite hard to understand, or who may not understand us at all. God's reconciliation is across borders and boundaries. When we are trying to build bridges in our "already–not yet" reality, it takes a lot of grace."<sup>[1]</sup>

All of this from one little word, one tiny preposition: <u>with</u>. <u>With</u> changes everything, at least that's how I see it this month. It reminds me of what Pastor Larry taught me all those years ago: our privilege is looking for where God is *already* present and active. So, friends, go and serve <u>with</u> your neighbor this month (and in the months and years to come). Give <u>with</u> your neighbor. Hope <u>with</u> your neighbor. Forgive <u>with</u> your neighbor. In a world where we far too often define ourselves by which neighbors we will not acknowledge, God calls us to reconcile and be reconciled to one another, to work <u>with</u> one another for the sake of all our other neighbors. May your service <u>with</u> your neighbors be blessed to be a blessing, now and always.

- $\hfill\square$  As you GO with your neighbors, how do you describe your vocation?





# **COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS SEPTEMBER 2023**

- 1. Doug installed a whiteboard over the chalkboard in the Children's Music Room.
- 2. A social media intern candidate rejected our offer. We are exploring another option.
- 3. Bat House construction (Eagle Scout Project) continues.
- 4. We have 4 youth and 2 adults registered for the Youth Gathering in New Orleans in 2024. We need to raise about \$4000.00 to be able to go. More fundraisers are coming.
- 5. Regular giving in August was \$9627.92 less than the budget estimate. Year to date regular giving is less than the budget estimate by \$26,343.32. Special giving for August was \$4,915.28. The Backpack Program is fully funded for the Fall Semester.
- 6. Opening checkbook balance was \$23,623.01. Closing balanced was \$22,023.69. Opening savings was \$44,149.58 and closing was \$44,155.21.

# PASTOR'S COUNCIL REPORT SEPTEMBER 2023

- 1. Zoom has decided it no longer wishes to work with higher levels of software, such as OBS, which is what we use to livestream worship on Sundays. I've spent considerable time with Ken Osborn trying to figure this all out and communicating new expectations and instructions to the congregation. Streaming via YouTube was always the "end goal," but this change on Zoom's end has forced our hand to move faster than we had planned.
- 2. Since the August Council Meeting, we have had 5 Harvest Host guests. Two couples have joined us to worship on Sunday and were warmly welcomed by the congregation.
- 3. Fall Programming began on September 6. I have 8 for Wednesday Night Bible Study (Revelation), 1 for Confirmation (new curriculum called "A Toolbox for Faith"), and 6 for the Book Study (*Wisdom's Daughters*).
- 4. Pastor Otto Schultz is retiring from Faith Partners as of Sept 30. Terri Efflie will be our new coaching partner. Members of the group include myself, Jim Yankech, and Charlotte Veberg.
- 5. The September Faith, Family, and Food Truck event with Mary Ellen's and Kona Ice was well attended and a huge success. The October 11 Food Truck will be Skymart Foods. The Youth will sell cookies for a fundraiser.
- 6. I spent some time on September 16 updating the website and making new links to YouTube for worship. A button for Zoom meetings is on there, too.
- The Vitality Initiative Committee has planned a "Potluck at Pastor's" event for Sunday, October 1, 5-7pm. The congregation is invited to bring a dish, salad, or dessert to share and lawn chairs and enjoy fellowship in the parsonage backyard.

Youth News:

- Three churches are coming together to form a Tri-Church Youth Group: American, Grace, and St. Andrew's. Our first meeting will be Sunday, Sept 24 at Grace where we will play games and get to know each other. The second meeting will be Sunday, November 5, meeting at Wyuka Funeral Home for a tour of the mortuary and then a tour of the cemetery (for All Saints' Day), concluding at American with chili, cinnamon rolls, and hot cocoa. The third meeting will be hosted by St. Andrew's in 2024 (date and activity TBD). I attended a Youth Minister Meeting at Sheridan on Sept 14 and learned about citywide ELCA Youth activities being planned.
- 2. I found out about transportation opportunities to the Youth Gathering in New Orleans in 2024.
- 3. We have 2 adults and 4 youth planning to attend the Gathering. We need to raise at least \$3000.00 more to go.
